### The Desired Results Developmental Profile (DRDP)

The DRDP uses observations of children's skills in everyday routines and activities to measure their developmental and learning progress. It's used with children with and without disabilities. The Desired Results Access Project provides assessment supports including:

- Adaptations to measure children's abilities rather than disabilities.
- Guidance for assessing children, including those with specific disabilities.
- Materials to promote family engagement.

The DRDP is used for accountability by the California Department of Education (CDE), informing the effectiveness of its services for young children.

## The Desired Results Access Project implements the

DRDP for children with IFSPs and IEPs and CalBloom which provides an evidence-based framework of inclusive instructional practices through:

- → Leadership: Collaboration with California's early childhood and special education system.
- Partnerships: Relationships with districts and SELPAs to better understand local needs and jointly implement improvements.
- Professional Development: Sustainable evidence-based practices taught and supported, focused on implementation, improvement, and systems change frameworks.
- → Technology-based Information: Systems to collect and report valid DRDP data statewide for children with IFSPs and IEPs and dissemination of child outcomes findings to inform program improvement.

## Services Provided by the Desired Results Access Project

#### **CalBloom | Early Learning EveryDay**

**CalBloom.org** provides an evidence-based framework of instructional practices in inclusive preschool classrooms, linking DRDP results to learning opportunities during everyday activities. CalBloom is implemented using job-embedded professional development and Practice-Based Coaching.

#### **DRDP Training and Professional Development**

**DRAccessLearn.org** provides DRDP training for special educators. Additional professional development available year-round. All training and professional development is provided at no cost.

#### DR Access Child-Level Reports for Children with IFSPs and IEPs

**DRAccessReports.org** illustrates a child's developmental status and progress, identifies strengths and needs, assists in developing standards-based goals and outcomes, informs instruction and intervention, and provides meaningful results for families.

#### State, SELPA, and District Reports

DRAccessData.org allows SELPAs to easily upload and certify DRDP data for submission to CDE twice yearly. Data reports indicate the quality and completeness of the submission and assist with improvement opportunities. Historical reports assist with management and administration of the DRDP.

#### Federal Child Outcomes Reporting

**DRAccessOutcomes.org** displays California's preschool outcomes at the local and state level. The CDE uses aggregated DRDP results for federal preschool outcomes reporting to the Office of Special Education Programs (OSEP).
